HOW THE WEB STOLE OUR CHILDREN

The other day my eight-year-old son asked me, ‘Mom, what was your favourite website when you were little?’ The question illustrates the enormous gulf dividing today’s parents and their children. We were raised in an age when the sum total of what could be viewed on screen was four television channels with content strictly controlled. Today, our children can choose from scores of channels and - via the internet - visit thousands of uncensored virtual worlds at the click of a mouse. They spend all their free time on websites such as Facebook and MySpace (An American social networking service) which offer free and easy access to videos posted by other users including, on occasion, real scenes of violence. I can see why so many parents, like Helen Gayson for example, are so gravely concerned about internet use. Helen offers this as a description of her family life: ‘Whenever I picked up my daughter Shannon from school and I said I needed to pop to the shops on the way home, she’d become agitated because she wanted to get on to her PC.’

She describes a girl who rushed to switch on the computer before she had even taken off her coat. ‘I was at my wits’ end on how to stop Shannon using the internet so much. I worried constantly that she put it above everything else, especially her school work. I estimate she was online at least 50 hours a week. Many of Shannon’s hours were spent on the messaging service MSN where she could message friends on screen. The system is much faster than e-mail, making communication more like a conversation. But what can be the quality of such friendships compared with the relationships that might exist with perhaps a handful of real close friends? I was also very concerned that she was up so late. I found that too much internet use disturbed Shannon’s sleep patterns. She became very tired in the morning and it was hard to get her out of bed.’

‘Then last week I reached boiling point as far as Shannon’s internet use is concerned. I went upstairs to find her still on the laptop. It was past midnight and I’m afraid I just snapped. To switch off the laptop as fast as possible, I must have tugged at the lead a bit too hard because it broke. But I don’t regret it and I am not planning on getting the laptop mended soon because I was so fed up that Shannon was on the internet so much.’

A report from the institute of Public Policy Research describes a generation of teenagers effectively being raised by the internet. It says that many under-16’s spend more than 20 hours a week glued to the internet. Millions are left to surf the web on their own, with six out of ten having seen online pornography, most of it accidentally in the form of pop-ups. Many are also exposed to scenes of violence. The report points out, that social life is an essential part of growing up. But it warns that just as we wouldn’t be happy about

young people engaging unsuitable activities offline, with no adult present to protect them and help them understand, so the same should be true when they are online. It urges parents to wise up and learn how the internet operates, particularly social networking sites, so that they can participate alongside their children at times, just as their own parents had once played football with them.
